### **Theme 1: Criminal Justice System Responses to Public Health Issues**

1. Sam Redgate (Northumbria University)- Evidencing the need: speech, language and communication provision within Youth Offending Services
2. Melissa Willoughby (University of Melbourne)- Preventing violence-related deaths among people exposed to the criminal justice system
3. Daniel Jones (University of Huddersfield)- The benefits of incarceration, as a commentary on the lack of appropriate programming from the voices of incarcerated women
4. Mudia Uzzi (John Hopkins University)- Temporal relationship of criminal justice involvement and transactional sex among black men who have sex with men in Baltimore, Maryland: Depressive symptoms as a mediator
